DECEMBER - Branch

When you speak about a branch, what do you think about? A river has many branches. A business can have many branches. There can be branches off of a main language, a race or even a family tree. A main road such as an interstate has many roads branching off which take you in other directions and to other places.

Years ago, Yvonne and I were running a shuttle for our son kayaking on the Upper Youghiogheny River. We actually put Curt on the river in West Virginia and we met him at the takeout back in the wilderness of western Maryland. Parking along the river waiting, an older couple stopped and a woman with a look of worriedness told me that they were lost and asked me if I could give them directions back to US Rt 40. I responded, "Sure, you see the road that you are on?

Just keep following it and it will take you anywhere you want to go." Well, her looks were that she wanted to kill me! But, we did get them out of the mountain and back on the road they wanted which they had to drive on other roads branching off of one another.

In John 15:1-17, Jesus teaches using a vine and a branch. I've given these verses a sub-title asking, "Are you a hardwood or softwood?" Here Jesus uses a grapevine for an analogy for us to grow from having a love relationship with Him and to be fruitful. Christ is our model. The more we know of Him, the more we will be like Him! * Let's use a tree for an example. The roots are God (vinedresser vs. 1) feeding and pouring all of His wisdom, knowledge and strength into Jesus, the main trunk (true vine vs. 1) which is teaching, feeding and sharing all of what He has been given from our Father into us, the many branches (true believers vss 2-3). Then, there are many smaller branches growing out of the larger branches which bear the fruit and leaves. These smaller branches are new believers. Jesus shares many rewards for us being a branch which produces much fruit (vs. 5). A branch that bears fruit will be pruned in order to bear more fruit (vs. 2). You may ask of anything and it will be given to you (vs. 7). You will be His disciple (vs. 8). You will abide in His love (vs. 10). Your joy will be made full (vs. 11). You are no longer called His slaves but, called His friends (vs. 14-15). But the greatest of all of these is that you will love one another (vs 17)!

So, you see, God is bringing radiant anointing nourishment (thru) Christ healing us as Christ helps us teach new babes in Christ! Our lives don't need to

be beautiful, they just need to be available!

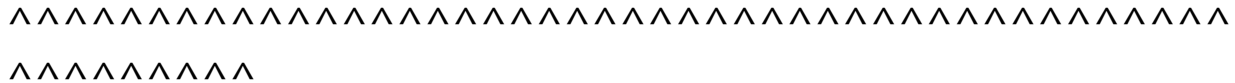

The History of Advent

For many Christians unfamiliar with the liturgical year, there may be some confusion surrounding the meaning of the Advent season. Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think that it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent.

The History of Advent

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning "coming," which is a translation of the Greek word *parousia*.

Advent symbolizes the present situation of the church in these "last days" (Acts 2:17, Hebrews 1:2), as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom. The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament. Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis they called for God once again to act for them. In the same way, the church, during Advent, looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.

To balance the two elements of remembrance and anticipation, the first two Sundays in Advent (through December 16) look forward to Christ's second coming, and the last two Sundays (December 17 - 24) look backward to remember Christ's first coming. Over the course of the four weeks, Scripture readings move from passages about Christ's return in judgment, to Old Testament passages about the expectation of the coming Messiah, to New Testament passages about the announcements of Christ's arrival by John the Baptist and the Angels.

While it is difficult to keep in mind in the midst of holiday celebrations, shopping, lights and decorations, and joyful carols, Advent is intended to be a season of fasting, much like Lent.

While Advent is certainly a time of celebration and anticipation of Christ's birth, it is more than that. It is only in the shadow of Advent that the miracle of Christmas can be fully understood and appreciated; and it is only in the light of Christmas that the Christian life makes any sense. It is between the fulfilled promise of Christ's first coming and the yet-to-be-fulfilled promise of this second coming.

THOU DIDST LEAVE THY THRONE

Emily S. Elliott, 1836-1897

"I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full (John 10:10)

This spiritually enriching text differs from the usual Christmas songs since it focuses not only on Jesus' birth but also on His life on earth, His suffering and death, and the ultimate triumph of His second advent.

This hymn was written by Emily Elliott to teach children the truths of the advent and nativity seasons. Emily's life was filled with benevolent activities in rescue missions and in the work of the Sunday school movement of that time. Although she wrote this text for the children of her father's church, St. Mark's Anglican Church in Brighton, England, the easily understood wording, the poetic imagery, and the spiritual truths found in these excellent lines soon made the hymn a widespread favorite everywhere.

The clear message of each verse is accentuated by the use of contrasting sentences, each beginning with the word "but." Then in the fifth stanza, the contrast is reversed with the rejoicing at Christ's return and the prospects of being at His side throughout eternity. The refrain after each verse effectively personalizes the truth presented. This fine hymn has proved to be an inspiration not only to children but to adults as well, during the Christmas season and also throughout the entire year.

Read the words of this Christmas hymn.

Thou didst leave Thy throne and Thy kingly crown when Thou camest to earth for me; but in Bethlehem's home was there found no room for Thy holy nativity.

Heaven's arches rang when the angels sang, proclaiming Thy royal degree; but of lowly birth didst Thou come to earth, and in great humility.

The foxes found rest, and the birds their nest in the shade of the forest tree; but Thy couch was the sod, O Thou Son of God, in the deserts of Galilee.

Thou camest, O Lord, with the living word that should set Thy people free, but with mocking scorn and with crown of thorn they bore Thee to Calvary.

When the heav'ns shall ring and the angels sing at Thy coming to victory, let Thy voice call me home, saying, "Yet there is room - there is room at My side for thee," My heart shall rejoice, Lord Jesus, when thou comest and callest for me!
